

Win if required

Strategy Requirements



Feasible

- Affordable in peacetime
- Executable now

Credible


- Transparent reduce uncertainty
- Slow escalation
 - Reduce value of first strike
 - No "window of opportunity"
- Best strategy can't be beaten pre-war




Offshore Control – Defend, Deny, Dominate Defend 1st Island Chain Deny inside the 1st Island Chain Dominate outside 1st Island Chain Goal is make China's exports non-competitive Identify and control top 1000 ships Rebuild global economy Theory of conflict termination

China's Anti-Access







ASM at Chokepoints





Strategic Advantage = United States




Global Trade Routes





Means



- Available today
 - Geography A2/AD works both ways
 - Submarines, limited air, ASCM, mines (if we develop) – inside 1st island chain
 - Combined defense 1st island chain allies that will permit it
 - Air, surface navy, Marines outside 1st island chain

Future –

- Small, many, and smart
- Alternatives to space and cyber

Economic strangulation Energy blockade will NOT be decisive 1000 ships – exports and imports **Concentric circles** Deny – inside 1st island chain; fallback is Malacca, Sunda, Lombok, N & S Australia, **Eastern Pacific** Defend – 1st island chain (where invited) Dominate – outside 1st island chain




Ends

China chooses to end war
Same as four previous CCP external conflicts – Korea, India, USSR, Vietnam
"We taught them a lesson."
Similar end to P-3 crisis


Clearly NOT "win decisively"

Deter China



Peacetime

- Encourage economic growth
- Expense of defeating; no vulnerability gap
- No short war
- Crisis
 - No 1st strike incentive
 - US cannot initiate
- Wartime
 - Unsolvable problem

CCP legitimacy
